Now a wife and mom of her own two teens, she's been gone since leaving Chamberlain High for college in 1988, yet Carrollwood Drive is still 'home.'

It was the Blizzard of '78 in the Northeast that tipped the scales in my husband's choice of the FL sales territory over Boston. His boss in the sporting goods industry, Mike Sloan, had lived on Areca Road and spoke effusively about this award-winning model community. That April brought me to Florida for the first time. We checked out south Tampa, Davis Island, and Temple Terrace but found our heart's desire with both a fireplace and pool right here. Little did we know one would be used five days a year and the other 5 months!

Bowls and books are boxed, and we're thrilled to move closer to Pam and her family in the Charlotte area. Trading palm trees for autumn leaves, we leave with memories of 38 years in OC: Picnics at White Sands, birthday parties at Scotty Cooper, founding Carrollwood Newcomers, countless Halloween parades and glorious luminarias, but most of all, sharing the ebb and flow of life in this remarkable community. 

QUIT CLAIM DEED vs. WARRANTY DEED

A Quit Claim Deed is the legal way that one person (the grantor) transfers real property, such as a house or land, to another person (the grantee). As an example, a divorcing husband may Quit Claim his interest in certain real estate to his ex-wife. While the concept is simple and straightforward – relinquishing all ownership claims to a particular property – it's also important to note what a Quit Claim can't do.

In renouncing claim, the grantor makes no guarantee or promise that the property is free of debt. Another important distinction is that the grantor makes no promise that no one else claims to own the property. Tracing its origin to Anglo-Norma times (circa 1,000 CE), the Quit Claim deed says, in effect, that the grantor is signing over whatever ownership he or she may have in the property. It does not even guarantee that the grantor has any ownership interest at all. By accepting such a deed, the grantee assumes all of the risks.

Furthermore, many title companies are reluctant to insure title when a Quit Claim deed was used previously to transfer title, and therefore, recommend use of a warranty deed instead. A warranty deed conveys full title to the property and warrants that title against defects, such as tax liens, legal judgments and unpaid debts.

If one of these type deeds has ever been used on your property it is advisable that you consult a Real Estate attorney to review the deed to get assurances that the property is securely titled without allowing for a cloud to exist. Then, when you prepare to sell your property, you will have a completely free and clear title for insurance purposes.

In essence, when you are modifying ownership, DO IT RIGHT. The Warranty Deed is your best approach of these two choices.

While we are busy piecing our world back together like a puzzle in the dark, that person, *our* person, may be falling apart


—a silent sufferer in a crazy kaleidoscope of a world where tumultuous troubles collide all around them.
